Update on Cornucopia Farmers Market

The 2020 Cornucopia Farmers Market was held on Thursdays 4:00 – 6:00 p.m. in the side yard of Cornucopia Coffee & Sweet Shoppe. Customers had the option of shopping the market in person or placing an online order for a minimal-contact pick-up.

The market ran from early July through mid-September. At that point, the COVID situation was beginning to worsen and we decided to shift the market to online only. Online orders (with pick-up at Corny Coffee) continued until Thanksgiving.

Over the course of the season, the market featured ten different vendors. Products included fruits, vegetables, microgreens, flowers, maple syrup, honey, jams, pickles, soap, art and crafts.

Justine Broderson did a superb job creating a safe shopping environment. Her signs, Facebook posts, and always-smiling presence encouraged customers to social distance and wear masks. We also provided free masks and hand-washing stations at the market. We appreciate everyone in the Corny community for following protocols to keep us all safe!

The market managers completed training that enabled the Corny Market to accept SNAP benefits (a.k.a. food stamps). We have a joint account with the Bayfield Farmers Market to process these benefits.

We felt that the market was a great success! We were pleased to provide the South Shore with fresh produce in a safe outdoor setting.

As we look forward to next year, we hope to increase the number of regular market vendors, improve advertisement, and begin accepting Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program vouchers.
